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Serapio Through As Fickle Spouse Again Leaves Him

"Lupe's eloped again." That was the message the father of Lupe Barra Rodriguez, 18, of San Juan, brought to county probaton authorities today.

Lupe, the girl of three elopements, has disappeared this time, her father said. On July 30 she eloped from home with Serapio Rodriguez and they were married, though she was scheduled to marry another man the next day.

The other man, however, came to her new husband's home on July 31 and took the bride away with him. Mrs. Virginia Mendez, assistant probaton officer, found the girl August 3 and took her back to her mother.

A week later the girl came to probaton authorities and asked: "Which man would you take if you were me? Both Serapio and Benny want me."

Last Saturday Lupe told officials she finally had decided to go back to her husband. Serapio was hunting a house.

The father told the rest of the story today when he came to ask officials to find his daughter.

"Her husband rented a house and had it fixed up nice," Mr. Ibarra said. "He took my daughter over to see it Saturday night. They agreed they would move in on Sunday, when Serapio did not have to work. My daughter came back home and was sitting out in the front yard the last I saw of her. I think she went off with her old sweetheart. Serapio says he is done with her for good."

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File New Cases On El Pasoans Who Cage Birds

With four persons already fined in justice A. J. Wilson's court on charges of violation of game laws, which forbid confinement of wild birds in cages, three other cases were to be given a jury trial in justice H. B. Rawlin's court Wednesday on similar charges.

D. W. Davis, state game warden for El Paso and Hindsport counties, filed the complaints after finding mockingbirds singing away in their cages in different sections of the city.

Mr. Davis said Wednesday that he had issued no warnings, and "intended to issue no warnings" in connection with the law.

"It's an old law, and I'm going to file on everybody who has caged birds, other than parrots and canaries, which are excepted under the law," he said.

Amador Reyes, 600 block South Florence street, and Nattie Rodriguez, Maria Hernandez and Carmen Diaz, of the 400 block on South Florence, were fined \$10 and costs each in Wilson's court Tuesday. Just before Mr. Davis filed similar complaints against Charlie Lawrence, 312 Guadalupe street; J. A. Alameda, 1820 Myrtle avenue, and Mamie Ruiz, 3209 Montana street.

The latter cases will be tried in justice Rawlin's court Wednesday before a jury.

Dave Maloney, county attorney, said Wednesday that he would prosecute the cases if complaints were filed, although he agreed with others that warnings should have been given by the game warden.

"It may be ignorance of the law. These people have no intention of violating the law, and everyone who knows the Mexican people knows that they love birds. Since the law has never been enforced in the past, I think warnings should have been issued by the warden, instead of wholesale arrests," he said.

Davis was appointed warden for El Paso and Hindsport counties only a month ago. Only zons are excepted under the law forbidding the confinement of wild birds, it was said.

Chicano Kid Sent Across Bridge By U. S. Authorities

Miguel Martinez, 17, the erstwhile "Chicano Kid," terror of Cordova Island, Wednesday was turned over to immigration officers for deportation to Mexico, when the U. S. commissioner found that he did not have enough evidence to hold the boy on liquor charges.

"Chicano," who only a month ago returned from the National Training school at Washington, D. C., where he served a two-year sentence, was arrested last Sunday with a woman, Maria Martinez, in connection with bringing liquor into the United States.

But, officers point out, deportation to Mexico doesn't mean anything to Chicano's young life. He will be back on this side within 48 hours after he is deported, it is believed.

Chicano, who in years gone by has thrilled even border patrolmen with his wild antics along Cordova island, was made a sergeant while he was an inmate in the training school. He told officers that he was "going to be a good boy," upon his return to El Paso.

Mosquitoes Assail Saloon Customers On Cordova Island

"The liquor's good but the mosquitoes have a kick, too," one person who tried the new saloon on Cordova island at the foot of Encalypsis street last night said today.

Following the printing of stories Tuesday about the saloon that has been opened up on Mexican territory on this side of the river just a few paces over the international boundary line, the place did a thriving business last night. Patrons found an adobe house

with a patio with oilcloth covered tables. An old-fashioned lantern cast flickering shadows. You sipped your beer between intermittent slaps at mosquitoes.

It was reported today that some enterprising Americans are leasing vacant ground on the American side of the line near the saloon to rent for parking space. United States customs officials have decreed autos may not be brought back across the line at this point.

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
